		Department of Water Resources (DWR) Kathi Delegal reported DWR has been given authority to spend \$240 million for drought activities and this funding can be used to fund IRWMP projects currently underway. There is a potential for unpaid invoices to be paid. It was also reported that the draft implementation guidelines are expected by the end of May and final guidelines at the end of September. The expedited grant funding round is expected to be completed by the end of the year.	

## 5. Legislative Update

Rich Nagel provided an overview of the following legislative bills in the State Legislature:

- AB 1366
  - o This measure would allow local public agency-owned or –operated street sweepers to utilize automated parking enforcement systems to further serve the public interest in a manner that will enhance their benefits to the environment, improve water quality, decrease storm water drain runoff, and help reduce ongoing habitat deterioration. Supported by West Basin WMD. Water softener bill to regulate water softeners and limit salt loading has a good chance of approval
- AB 49
  - o 20 percent conservation by 2020
  - Has a good chance of passing this year targeting 20 percent less usage per person per day.
  - May be able to comply as an agency, group or IRWM Group
- SB 565
  - o Call for recycling of 50 percent of discharges to ocean water
- AB 410
  - Allocation of \$5 million in Proposition 84 funds for salt and nutrient management plans.
- AB 139
  - This measure authorizes the Los Angeles County Flood Control District (district) to impose a fee in compliance with Article XIII D of the California Constitution, to pay the costs and expenses of carrying out projects and providing services to improve water quality and reduce stormwater and urban runoff in the district. The bill would require that any fee imposed be levied and collected, together with taxes for county purposes, and the revenues paid into the county treasury to the credit of the district. The bill would require the district to allocate the funds generated by the imposition of the fee in a specified manner solely for authorized purposes and in compliance with a specified constitutional provision. Working on moving the bill forward
- AB 1336
  - This measure would allow local public agency-owned or —operated street sweepers to utilize automated parking enforcement systems to further serve the public interest in a manner that will enhance their benefits to the environment, improve water quality, decrease storm water drain runoff, and help reduce ongoing habitat deterioration. Supported by West Basin WMD.
