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	Integration opportunities • Developer of the Gateway Center is being approached as a partner because they will be required to address stormwater quality as a part of their development. 2) City of Lynwood – Carnation and Rose Parks Adolfo Lopez provided a summary of the project: • The project will enhance an existing green space in the city which is frequently used for active recreation. • The project will involve storm water supplied irrigation or a water quality treatment BMP, or both. • Sub-Watershed F of the Compton Creek Watershed Drains the Cities of South Gate and Lynwood. • The contributing land uses in this area are mostly residential, but there are many industrial facilities and several scrap metal yards upstream. • Further downstream, this untreated storm water flows through the East Fork of the Compton Creek and into remnant wetland habitat in the earthen-bottom Compton Creek channel. • Potential stormwater treatment park space at State Street and Los Flores Boulevard in Lynwood. • Opportunities to treat significant stormwater flow from South Gate and Lynwood exist within a multiple-benefit park space which could include storm-water supplied irrigation, active and passive recreation, habitat enhancement, stream daylighting, and educational features.
